"Christmas Festivities Across the Globe: A Global Celebration in Three Acts"




them to the Kiosk where Lesley gets to work putting them on display ready for sale.

Coaching Tips

Gripping a bowl. A key aim of bowling is to deliver the bowl close to the jack on its running surface. Your grip needs to feel comfortable in your hand and held in such a way as to best achieve your aim. Usually, the tip of the second finger should be in a central position under the bowl or the running side of the bowl with the rest of your fingers spread comfortably astride of the second finger. Your thumb is placed in a comfortable position on the side of the bowl.



Report for Village Voice December 2023

Meeting held on 10th November 2023

Thanks was expressed to CEO Kim Jackson for attending the meeting.

Progress reports on-going projects were received -

Survey of mobility scooter safety issues. (Marie Newton)

Survey of Footpaths & Crossings. (David Tennant)

On-going items were noted –

Electric Vehicle Fire Risk Mitigation advice.

Croquet lawn garden replanting still in progress.

Grant Centre development - Management is still waiting Council approval.

Editing of Activities Welcome Kit is proceeding.

Response from BVB Board with regards to Auditor.

Maintenance items raised -

Clarification of the process for maintaining outdoor seating.

The condition of some carports is of concern and require planned maintenance program.

Poor condition of some signs displaying unit numbers.

Lawn clippings are left in open areas and not being dispersed.

Outdoor lights may need rust protection and/or re-painting.

Other items discussed -

The feasibility of flex panels as an alternative for bin storage screening was tabled.

It was noted that garages and carports are charged a yearly fee. This provides an incentive for carports to be vacated when no longer needed.

Cash for Cans – the feasibility of money raising, similar to the Newspaper collection program was raised.

New software for Resident's records is being implemented which has the capability to print current information for each resident. This should be available by April 2024.

Café management change is encouraging.

Concerns for units without Air Conditioners - Residents can submit an Alteration and Additions form via their receptionist to have an A/C installed. The Village does not offer any payment plans, or equity deductions. It was suggested that a Village Voice article be prepared setting out possible loans available.

Finance report for October was presented.

15 — GUESTS STAYING IN VILLAGE

The Resident shall not permit any person to occupy the Premises for any aggregate period longer than four weeks in any twelve months without the prior consent of BVB. During this time the Resident shall also reside on the Premises unless BVB consents to his absence.

16 — VISITORS

Residents are encouraged to have their family and friends within the Village, but are requested to ask their guests to show full consideration for the common areas and for the safety and property of residents.

VILLAGE RESIDENTS RIVER CRUISE

The older children had to keep the accounts and balances in order.



All the meals we enjoyed were excellent and I am sure we all brought a couple of extra pounds home with us.

We finished our trip with a night at the Hilton hotel in Adelaide before flying home on the following Saturday; exhausted but very happy with the holiday and having made closer friendships with other residents.


